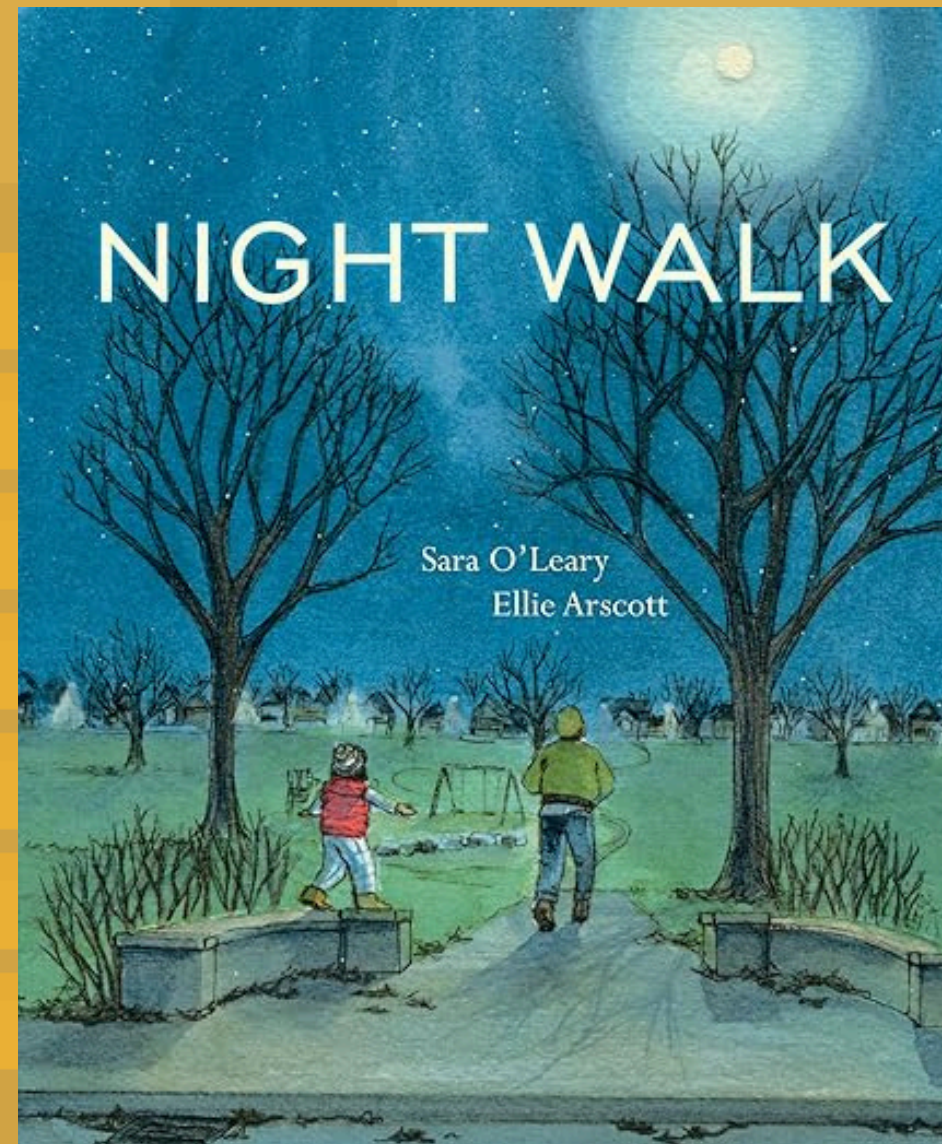
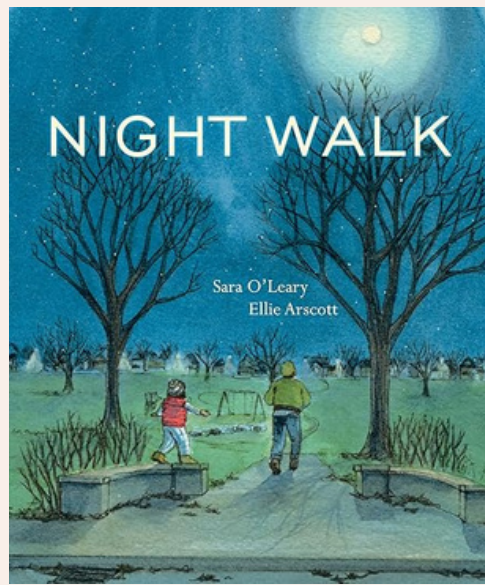

What did they see?



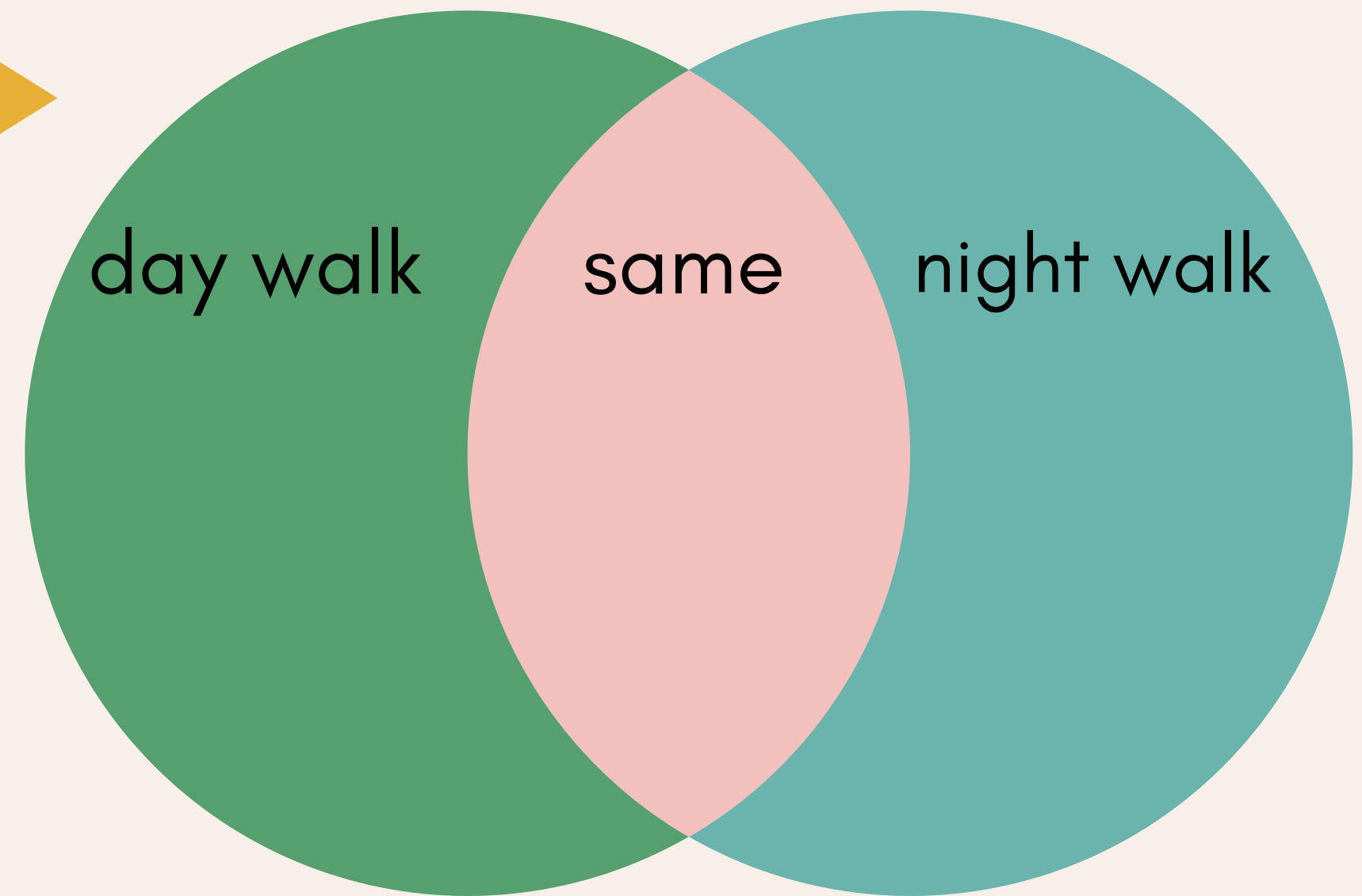
What did they hear?



After reading the story and completing the charts. Go for a community walk to document what they see and hear.

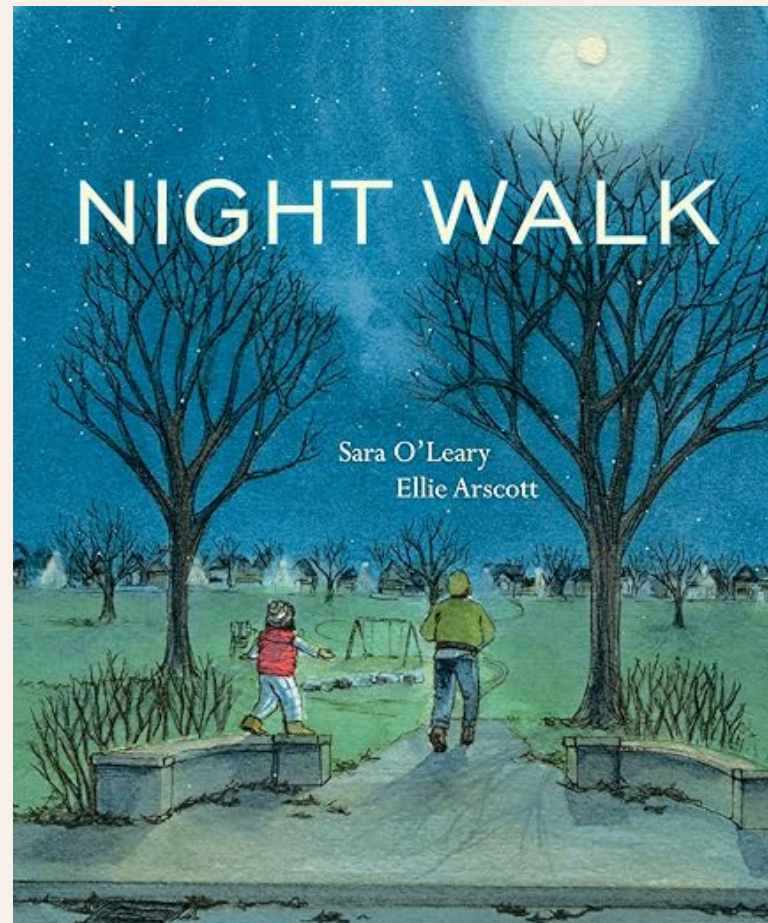


Compare the day walk vs the night walk. What was the same?

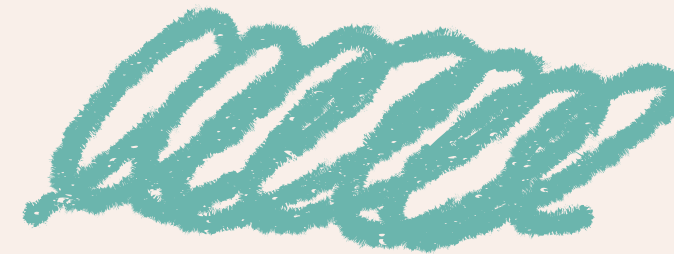

Practice using the pastels before creating art work. Create circles, squiggly lines, and wavy lines!

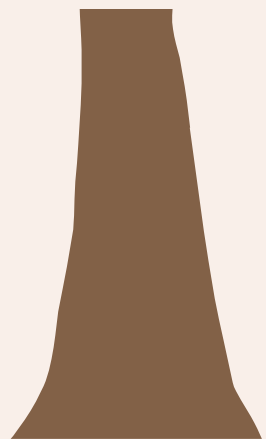
Share about oil pastels:

Oil pastels are drawing utensils made from pigment, wax and oil. They look like a crayon, but they are much softer. Oil pastels have a creamy texture and their colours are bright and vibrant.

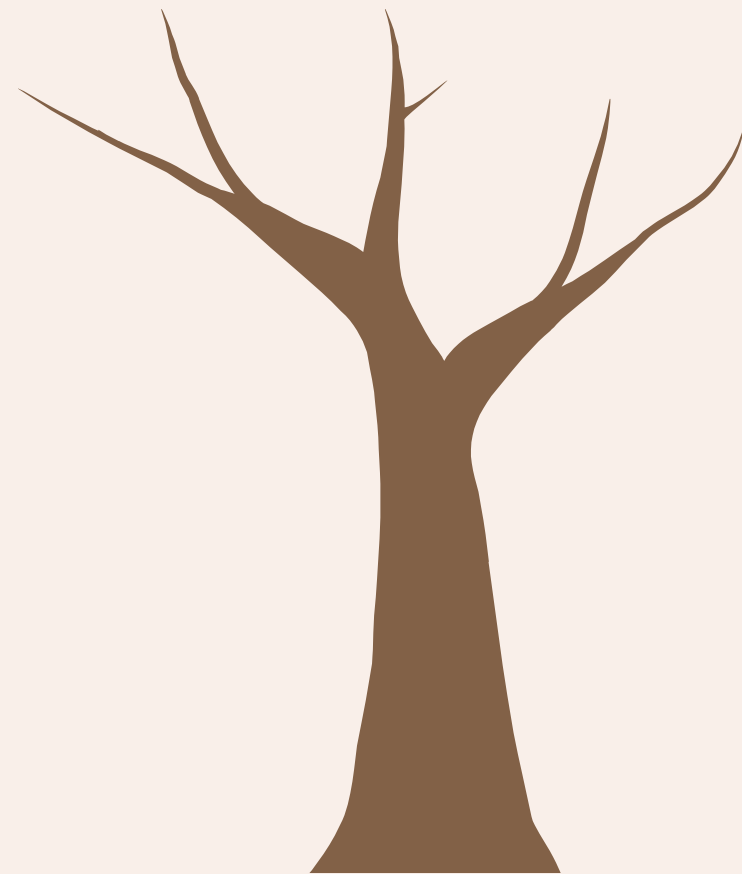




Art Activity: Creating Trees



Draw a rectangle
wider on the bottom
and skinny on top



Add the branches,
you can draw
straight or wavy
lines

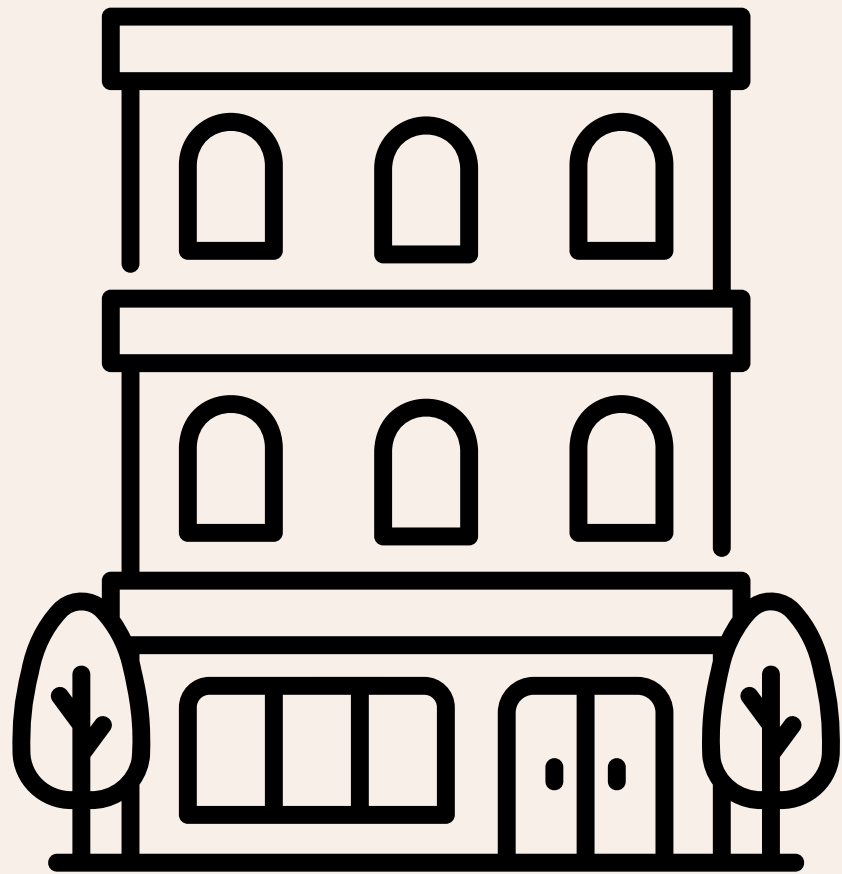


Colour with circles

Art Activity: Creating Buildings



Share a photo of one or two of the buildings the class saw on the walk.

What shapes do you see? List the geometric shapes they saw.

Draw some shapes together.

Invite children to then create the buildings by sketching first and next going over with markers.

Note: Children can draw the buildings on white paper and cut out. They can place on a colourful background to create the city scape.



Art Activity: Final Drawing #1

Guide children to colour the back ground (including trees) and then add the buildings.

They can use markers to create the buildings or draw separately and cut out then glue.
